

SCHOOL STRESS AND RESOURCES

If you are attending Anne Arundel Community College (AACC) in the fall, there are many mental health resources to make the transition to college easier to manage.

GETTING STARTED

Anne Arundel Community College (AACC) has a variety of resources that are easily accessed to help students in need. If you are interested in locating and using these facilities, here is how to do so. You can start by heading over to the home page for AACC at aacc.edu. From there you click on "Resources for Students" (at the top of the page), then look under "Health and Personal Counseling." In this tab, there is a link that will take you to a variety of counseling services and a video detailing how to connect you with counselors and get to know them. There is also a section labeled "Additional Help" that has resources including a health and wellness center, a food pantry and a help link with even more resources. There are numerous benefits and ways these specific resources can assist you in times of stress and need during college.

HEALTH & WELLNESS CENTER

The Health and Wellness Center nurses work from 9 a.m.- 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and are able to assist students and staff with a variety of issues ranging from health and wellness referrals/resources to substance abuse and recovery support. You can contact these nurses by phone at 410-777-2480 or by email at bamays@aacc.edu. When calling outside of business hours, simply leave a voicemail with your name, phone number and AACC ID number and they will respond to your call as soon as possible. If you decide to call during service hours, the counselors will respond within the hour. If you are in need of more food-based help, you can gain access to their provided food pantry.

FOOD PANTRY

You can find this link at the bottom page of counseling services on the AACC website under "Additional Help." The Office of Student Engagement is connected with the Maryland Food Bank to work and has an on-campus pantry at AACC which works to keep faculty and staff well fed. Students can also make an appointment to visit the Arnold or Glen Burnie Center Pantries if they need further assistance. If you have any questions about appointments or other aid you can always email staff at studenthelplink@aacc.edu. If you

need something more along the lines of housing or transportation assistance, you can click the help link labeled "HelpLink Grants" located under the "Additional Help" tab as well.

HELP LINK

The AACC HelpLink offers childcare, housing, medical/health care, transportation and even textbooks for students who are unable to afford them. Although these solutions are only temporary, they can be incredibly beneficial for those who are struggling financially while trying to continue their education. In order to be eligible for these resources, you must be enrolled in an approved AACC study, demonstrate financial hardship, participate in a free student success-related workshop or seminar and have no violations/investigations of the Student Code of Conduct. Although teachers can fill out their own referral form, students also have the ability to apply or ask questions at studenthelplink@aacc. edu.

Students who are not in need are able to help out and volunteer by donating instead. You can do so through an online form found at the bottom of the Help Link information page. If you would like to send a link, you could do so by making it payable to the AACC Foundation, writing HelpLink in the memo line and mailing it to the AACC Foundation, 101 College Parkway, Arnold, MD, 21012-1895.

When looking at jobs, there are a lot of things to consider, these are some factors that may influence your decisions on your future job.



But it's also a great opportunity to get some job experience without it interfering with school. Although being able to manage your time is an essential part of life, not having school while looking for a job can make your life a lot easier. There are some simple ways to put yourself out there and get started.

Application information can be found from a quick Google search, and for many jobs you can apply right on the website. Some job search websites available are Monster, Indeed, Linkedin, Glassdoor and ZipRecruiter. These forums all offer the same information and opportunities and will show you job openings. Some of these sites also show the requirements for the job listed and what the job will entail. You need to make sure that you can do all of the tasks and skills that are required. If you can't do physical labor like heavy lifting, you will want to make sure to let your interviewer know about that during your interview. By law, reasonable accommodations should be made, especially if you have a note from a doctor.

There are problems with solely relying on these sites. If you want the best chance of being seen and considered for a job, going to the business in person puts a face to the resume, as well as the chance to get a job application or interview on the spot. Also, doing this can give you a feel for how the business or company operates and if it fits you and is going to be a high-stress job or not. If you choose to go in person, make sure to go on a weekday, preferably in the morning, as most businesses have a higher chance of being less busy and will have more time to meet with you. A good thing to remember: it is never a bad idea to call before you go for the interview to confirm that they are still hiring. This is an important step since many smaller businesses don't have their open positions posted on these job boards.





High school sometimes gets a bad rap for only offering standard, general classes and not doing the best to prepare students for their future plans. However, what people don't realize is that there are quite a few resources and programs offered at SPHS that give students opportunities to learn more about their specific career of interest.

One senior, Gemma Moran took it upon herself to join the CAT South program for nursing when she came to SPHS after learning about the program prior to ninth grade.

"I chose the program because they offered a lot of things to get ahead in the field," Moran said. "I already have my CPR certification and my clinical medical assistant certification and am projected to get my nursing assistant towards April and May."

For those who have not heard of this program specifically for nursing, it is split into multiple levels where students gain knowledge about the human body, medicine and patient care. Moran found that these classes were incredibly beneficial in solidifying her passion for helping others.

"The class was split into medical technology during level 1 which greatly improved my knowledge of anatomy and physiology, disease, treatments and diagnostic tests," Moran said. "I also attend clinicals at the nursing home in Ginger Cove which provides great learning opportunities to work with actual patients."

While other students are taking notes and tests in school, CAT South offers hands-on experience and real-world applications of skills necessary to succeed in the field of nursing. As a result of this program, Moran is already planning her future around what she has learned.

"I plan on getting my RN or registered nurse at a four year university and have applied to colleges," Moran said. "I'm also considering trying to get a job at AAMC [Anne Arundel Medical Center]."

While she has not committed to a college yet for this major, she plans on getting her bachelor's degree in nursing. Having already taken steps to enhance this dream, by getting her CCMA certification and working on her CNA, Moran is certainly on the right track to progress in this field using what she learned in CAT South to help her pass her tests and showcase her skills.

"To pass the CNA portion you must successfully complete over 20 skills and pass a written exam covering topics such as what's legal, how to care for a patient and other medical knowledge of diseases and conditions," Moran said. "It was definitely hard work but I would recommend it if it's something you are seriously considering."

If this is something that sparks your interest and drives your passion to be just like Moran and gain the experience and opportunities to learn about and advance your career, you should look into being a part of this program. SPHS seniors realize the unmatched resources offered at the high school and recognize that what they learned here can actually aid them in their futures, despite all the unknowns following that graduation day.
